
A Working Paradise for Everyone



The NAM SHAN Project – Preliminary Findings of the Champion Team (2016)

Our young designers attach great importance to making a green environment available in Hong Kong. The aim of revitalizing a historic region in the territory, the Nam Shan Estates, established since 1977, proved to be a challenge well worth their efforts. Initially, the team conducted detailed surveys and interviews to adjudicate the areas of concern. The old district lacked transport choices and user-friendly facilities for the elderly; it also had poor ventilation resulted from the typical walled buildings erected 40 years ago. Moreover, it suffered from an acute shortage of greenery and recreational facilities.

The design is much focused on the establishment of a new community complex which will house shops, a public library, a self-sufficient wet market, a car park and, and above all, a rooftop garden with solar panels that will generate electricity and a waste-water filtration system for watering the plants and vegetables. The blocks of tenants' flats will also be relocated to allow for the best air flow in the district.

What has she gained from the competition?



Travelling broadens our horizons. It allows us to build a more diverse and multidimensional world vision by experiencing the life and culture of other countries. Tom Yip , one of our F.5 students, was selected as one of the 22 Tung Wah Student Ambassadors to join a study tour to London. He described the experience as "a trip that was beyond my expectation".



What Was My Mission?

As this year marks the 150th anniversary of the birth of Dr Sun Yat-sen, we took this opportunity to follow his footprints in London and understand his determination to build modern China. Besides, throughout the tour, we studied the British economy, education and culture, and, most importantly, the life of Chinese immigrants living in the UK. My group was assigned to the topic "Economy and Trade", and I have gained an in-depth understanding of the economic relationships between Britain and Hong Kong by interviewing overseas-Chinese who are currently working in different fields. We also visited the British Museum, Cambridge University and interviewed the former Hong Kong Governor, Lord Wilson of Tillyorn to experience authentic British culture.

My Most Remarkable Memories

The meeting with Lord Wilson was definitely the most unforgettable memory for me. I remember we all lined up in front of the door of the meeting room that day, waiting for him solemnly. We were all nervous, but very much relieved when he shook hands with each of us gently. He was such a talkative and amicable gentleman. And I have learnt more about the differences in everyday life between Hong Kong and Britain.

Visiting the Embassy of China in the UK was another highlight of the tour. It's a place I had never thought of being granted such a chance to visit. We were also brought to the cell which Dr. Sun was kept as a prisoner by the Qing Government. All these would not have happened without the unfailing support and contribution of Tung Wah Group of Hospitals to Chinese all over the world.

Furthermore, I was pleased to visit two of the world-renowned universities in Britain, namely Cambridge University and University College London. Frankly, the study environments there are gorgeous, mesmerizing and relaxing. It was my pleasure to chat with several Hongkongers who are currently studying there. Knowing the difficulties they encountered also lets me know more about what studying overseas is like.

THE ORIGAMI CLUB




