The thrilling interview round

All participants have to pass two application rounds to be accepted into the programme. The first round consists of a written application in which applicants must answer questions and write down their expectations for the programme. Those who pass the written round go on to a second round consisting of an interview. 'It was so scary because all the participants looked so confident,' said Rameesha of the interview. Rameesha was anxious, but with the help of her teacher she prepared answers for many common interview questions - some of which she luckily was asked.

The interview was divided into two parts: a self-introduction and a group discussion. 'Everyone spoke confidently during the self-introduction, talking about their dream job, the posts they do at school, their interests and, most importantly, which official they want to follow,' explained Rameesha. At the beginning of the group discussion, Rameesha had some difficulty understanding some of the Cantonese words and found it difficult to keep up with other participants. However, she did not give up and was soon able to join in the discussion.

Through their sharing, Rameesha found out that every job has its own difficulties which must be overcome. Afterwards, Rameesha and her partner went to the Science and History Museum, where the museum head introduced the future plans of the museum to the Permanent Secretary. At lunch time, they ate at the restaurant in the Science museum. The Permanent Secretary even introduced some local food to Rameesha.

Then unexpectedly, they were told to give some suggestions during the interview! Overall, Rameesha thinks it was an amazing once-in-a-lifetime experience.

Advice for those wanting to join next year

First of all, you need to be an outgoing person; you should be talkative and give as many suggestions as you can. In the interview round, you should talk about your interests and which official you want to follow instead of talking about your school posts. Actually, the activity is great fun, so be enthusiastic and participate fully. If you have any worries, you can ask questions. The person-in-charge is friendly and willing to help you.

THE AI CHALLENGE



Two of our school students—Jacky Ye and Ken Kong won the “The AI Challenge: Weather Forecasting Competition” that was held in 2018. This competition requires secondary school students to use machine learning in artificial intelligence to predict the temperature of the Kowloon Bay Zero Carbon Building (ZCB) within a given time based on the real weather data provided by the Hong Kong Observatory over the past ten years.

The reason for joining the competition



Jacky and Ken joined the competition mainly because of their interests in robots and artificial intelligence. Jacky mentioned that he has been interested in the field of technology since he was in primary school and felt the need to enhance his technological skills in order to become a future leader in this field.

The keys to success



In their view, sacrifice and persistence are the keys to success in technology or any other fields. Success comes from spending a lot of time on a certain thing, so Jacky and Ken worked long and hard, pulled all-nighters and gave up their leisure time for this competition.

Difficulties faced

The pair faced some hard times on their road to success. One of the challenges they had to face was the inaccuracy of predictions. They kept getting results that showed a greater loss of temperature than they had predicted. To ameliorate that challenge, they tried different prediction models, optimized and analyzed the data and finally produced reliable forecasts. Communication was also the key to solving this challenge: they went online together to search for some unprecedented ideas, took in more information and found practical solutions.



The most stunning

Jacky and Ken revealed that developing and finishing their model was the most exciting part of the competition because it took a lot of hard work. After finalizing their model, they felt so satisfied and had learnt so many new things. It was definitely an eye-opening experience for them and they wish to have more opportunities like this in the future.

Gains Through The Competition

Through the process of this competition, Jacky mentioned that he had gained knowledge about both teamwork and professional skills. Working with a partner made him realize that everyone works at their own pace and that cooperation is essential. The skills of Jacky and Ken evolved together and Jacky learnt that temperature prediction is more than just boring data; it's a synthesis of the 'mentality' of humans and computers. Ken indicated that one's social abilities can improve through communication with teammate(s). He also refers to A.I. as a great technology that will make a tremendous impact on our future.

Suggestions

Some suggestions were given by the two students to people who are interested in participating in future competitions. They said that students should ask questions aggressively, even if they fear that their questions may come off as "stupid" or make them sound like a "rookie". There's a possibility that other people have the same question and that everyone else is just too afraid to ask the same question. Furthermore, students should read more books and do more research since these things are always beneficial. Finally, students should keep in mind that the ultimate goal of joining a competition is to expand our horizons rather than winning a certificate or a prize. We should treat competition as a challenge and remember that the process of learning is often our greatest reward.

Tung Wah Ambassadors head overseas to Vancouver

Starting from last summer holiday, Sharon and Simon attended training sessions each Saturday. There, they began preparing for a student performance they would give in Vancouver, learning unusual skills like acapella singing and creative balloon decoration. Being famous



The program has run for about four years. Each year, new elements have been added to enhance the program. This year, a team of producers followed the ambassadors around and documented the trip. Their documentary will become a series of TV programmes that will be shown in Canada and Hong Kong (on Viu TV).

These TV programmes were the idea of the Chairman of Tung Wah, Vinci Wong, as he was an actor before becoming the Chairman. These programmes allowed the ambassadors to not only learn about the history of the overseas Chinese in Vancouver, but also to learn media production skills. They visited Fairchild TV, a TV broadcast companies in Vancouver. Being one of the four group leaders, Simon was interviewed inside the studio and the interview was played on TV and radio in Vancouver. The ambassadors also had chances to be on news in Hong Kong too. They were interviewed by Oriental Daily, a daily news report in Hong Kong. The participating students found that these exciting new opportunities made them more confident in themselves.

Having fun on holiday

Canada is well known for its spectacular natural scenery and its fresh air, so the ambassadors did some outdoor sightseeing in Vancouver. For example, they collected maple leaves (the emblem of Canada) in Stanley Park. They visited the Capilano Suspension Bridge, which is a walking bridge that stretches across a running river and is very bouncy when one walks across it. They went on the famous Cliff Walk that hangs in the air, which is exciting, even for an acrophobe.

The ambassadors said that one of their most memorable experiences was taking the Sea-to-Sky Gondola. This is a cable car which climbs over the verdant mountains and offers an amazing view of other mountains and a bright blue lake that looks like silk. To get a closer look at the bright blue ocean, the ambassadors joined a whale watching tour. For three hours, they sat aboard a boat seeking the sight of a whale. At last, they saw some whale tails as the whales dove up and back into the sea. The Ambassadors also visited notable sites such as Gastown, Granville Island, and Britannia Shipyards National Historic site. All the sights are very amazing and really opened their eyes.

Learning history

The main objective for the ambassadors' trip was to discover the history of overseas Chinese in Vancouver and find out how this history was related to Tung Wah Group of Hospitals. Following the Fraser Valley "Gold Rush" of 1857, a few thousand Chinese came to Vancouver in search of gold. Soon thousands more began settling in and around Vancouver. Later, the construction of a railway began and many Chinese were recruited to help build the railway. Many Chinese from Hong Kong and Guangdong started immigrating to Vancouver for a better living. However, they were treated badly and discriminated against by the whites. The Chinese at that time had to pay a \$50 'head tax' for entry into Canada. \$50 at that time was a real challenge since \$500 was enough to buy a house! As Chinese kept entering Canada despite the tax, the government increased the tax continuously until it reached \$500.



Chinese people did many kinds of hard labour in Vancouver and western Canada. Some worked in the coal mines or planted vegetables. In towns, they set up laundries and restaurants. However, an act was passed in 1912 prohibiting Chinese restaurants and other small businesses from employing white women as they didn't want Chinese men to get close with or marry white women. By 1920, Chinese in Canada could not become lawyers, pharmacists or doctors in British Columbia or some other provinces. In addition, dead Chinese bodies were buried apart from those of white Christians in a special area for 'Aborigines and Mongolians' at the Ross Bay Cemetery. The living areas of the Chinese were even separated from those of the whites by a river, which Chinese were not supposed to cross. That's why Vancouver's Chinatown was created.

Things could not have been worse and eventually the Chinese couldn't bare it anymore. They formed organisations like the 'Hongmen' and the 'Chinese Consolidated Benevolent Association' to fight back and strive for their rights. Some young Chinese even joined the military and participated in World War I to gain greater societal respect. These actions all helped the rise of the Chinese in Vancouver.

Moreover, ambassadors visited several museums like the Museum of Anthropology and the B.C. Royal Museum to understand local history and culture. The Indian Totem poles looked very mysterious and stately, and are a remarkable historical relic. In the Gulf of Georgia Cannery, ambassadors learnt about the traditional salmon cannery procedure. They also visited the famous the University of British Columbia and received a brief introduction on how to get into the university. The ambassadors also met with Consul General TONG Xiaoling of the Consulate General of the People's Republic of China in Vancouver and attended a talk held by the Hong Kong Economic and Trade Office.

The Tung Wah Student Ambassador's Vancouver tour was an unforgettable and eye-opening experience for all participants. They learnt a lot of knowledge from the tour which will be useful in the future. If you are interested in being an ambassador, you are must be responsible for a project, be able to work in a team, be confident in speaking or communicating and be eager to learn. These are the most important characteristics a Tung Wah ambassador should have. Develop these characteristics and one day YOU might also find yourself on an exciting journey to Vancouver!

Fresh air from Taipei

The solemn Zhongxing Guesthouse

The most memorable moments were on the second day of our tour when we visited the Yangmingshuwu, also known as The Zhongxing Guesthouse, which was the reception venue for the significant foreign guests and a summer residence by the late Republic of China President Chiang Kai-shek. We could have a glimpse of how Chiang Kai-shek and his wife Soong May-ling lived there. There was a guided tour to show us around. The guide, who is around 60 years old, told us that the couple enjoyed a pleasant time there. He introduced the history of the guesthouse and the story of Chiang Kai-shek during his stay, with powerful stress while he was speaking. He could remember all the details and timeline of events in Chiang Kai-shek's lifetime. He led us to walk along the path for soldiers to patrol around the guesthouse. The way he walked was so unique—fast and vigorously.

Two inspiring stories from a retired army officer

When we were wondering why he had this unique demeanor, we bumped into his colleague. We then realized that he was a retired army officer. At the end of the guided tour, he told us two inspiring stories. The first story was about a farmer who was keen on planting corns. The farmer was willing to share his seeds with other farmers because he believed the quality of the corns could only be assured if everyone could gain the good seeds. This story teaches us that we should be generous and benevolent. The second story was about a Chinese doctor who was famous in America. But in the doctor's hometown, Taiwan, there were a lot of patients in need. So the doctor gave up his high position and great wealth in America, returning to Taiwan to help people in his hometown. The officer would like to tell us not to forget our roots, no matter how successful we would become. We are grateful for his inspirational stories.

After visiting The Zhongxing Guesthouse, we took a ride to Xiaoyoukeng, which is a spectacular landslide terrain formed by post-volcanic activity. The Incredible Journey of an Author



Have you ever wanted to become an author? We met W.C. Jefferson, a famous author, who has written a series of 13 children's books concerning the Chinese Zodiac. There are a total of 13 stories, each of which depicts the unique experiences of one of the 13 animals in the Chinese zodiac. He hopes that kids can not only enjoy the story plot, but also acquire moral values from his books.

Introduction

Mr Jefferson is an author who published his first book series, named *The Great Zodiac Race*, in America. The series has been honored as “Winner” in the “Children’s Picture Book: Softcover Fiction” category of the 2018 International Book Awards. This is the second time *The Great Zodiac Race* has won an award, having also been honored as Winner in the “Children’s Picture Book; Softcover Fiction” category for the 2017 Best Book Awards. After publishing the book in America, Mr Jefferson was invited by the Hong Kong Publishing Company to publish the books in Hong Kong. His books are now available both in bookstores and online. We can purchase them on Amazon!

Mr Jefferson used the 13 animals in the Chinese Zodiac story as the main characters in his books. It is a charming modern take on the classic Chinese story of how 13 different animals competed in a legendary race, with the first 12 winners receiving their own zodiac signs. The *Zodiac Race* series goes into detail about each animal’s story and shares the moral values and life lessons the characters learn along the way. Each story depicts the perspective of one animal in the race. The stories are all written in English and the lines rhyme. Mr Jefferson hopes that kids all over the world can acquire English and moral values in a fun and interesting way through reading his books. He thinks that moral values should be taught to kids at a young age as it is more effective to instill right values and attitudes early in life. His future books will also target mainly kids as he believes in an early intervention approach.

His path to becoming an author

Actually, being an author is quite a tough job as you need to be productive and creative. Mr Jefferson has never suffered from writer's block, which is a condition in which an author loses the ability to produce new work, or experiences a creative slowdown. The main problem he faced in the writing process was merely finding suitable rhyming words. Later, his most exhausting challenge was finding a publisher who was willing to publish his books.

Family support is vital in the creative process. Mr Jefferson received full family support indirectly. His family helped him in every way they could. His two sons were the inspiration for his story. He wrote all the things he wanted to teach his two sons in the books so that his sons could also learn moral values and improve their English at the same time.

His future plan

Mr Jefferson has a new detective series to be released soon. The illustrations of the upcoming books were done in watercolor as he thinks that will be visually appealing. For his new series, the theme is totally different from his series on the Chinese Zodiac. The new series is about cultures and cities. Mr Jefferson wants his series to be a kind of tourist guide to certain great cities in the world. Also, there will be more villains to make the stories more exciting and attractive to readers. Although the theme of his new series is different from that of his first series, the target age group of readers is still the same--kids. He hopes his book will be loved and appreciated by readers.

Never give up on your dreams

Although the job of a writer is a tough journey, one shouldn't give up easily. The most important thing for a writer is to think of a creative and meaningful story. In this way, a writer can surely attract more readers and leave a deep impression upon them.

"You need to believe in what you are doing. The first trial is definitely not the last version. You need to keep an open mind and try again and again until your best work is out," says Mr. Jefferson. He added that he also tried many times, especially at rhyming, to find the most suitable words and produce his best work. After many struggles and trials, he finally completed his first series.

Mr Jefferson thinks that teenagers need to keep trying new things. "If one thing doesn't work, try another. Keep trying until you find the thing that is the most SUITABLE for you.
