# Paris, Thanks for the Memories!

In November of last year, 7 of us travelled to Paris to participate in a competition called iGEM. The experience was incredible since our team was formed of students from different schools, which gave us a chance to make many new friends, making this trip even more exciting and enjoyable.

We had our initial meeting in February, but didn't start our laboratory work until the summer holiday began. This was my first experience conducting such complex laboratory tasks. We met other teams that came from different countries and shared our ideas and enthusiasm with each other. We also visited the Black Soldier Fly Farm and went to a primary school to teach primary students synthetic biology.



Unfortunately, we also encountered some obstacles: Two of our specimens failed to be induced, and the concentration of one of the purified specimens was too low. Yet overall, we had great success, making seven types of recombinant plasmids and inducing a total of five antimicrobial peptides while having a great time collaborating and developing a deeper understanding of synthetic biology and bioengineering. The most important thing is that we learnt how to work together and devote ourselves to the project.



Our team project was Antimicrobial Black Soldier Fly Ecoplaster. This product is designed to tackle four major societal problems, namely chronic wounds, bacterial infection, antibiotic resistance and plastic pollution. A unique feature of our product is that our plaster is made of substances that came directly from the black soldier fly, whose larvae are highly efficient at converting waste materials into valuable resources. Black Soldier flies are capable of reducing foul odours and outcompeting other fly species. In addition, they possess antimicrobial properties. Their larvae could play a crucial role in waste management and could be utilized in grub composting bins.

The exhibition was incredible. It included 121 high school teams along with 400 teams from 50 different countries and regions. In the exhibition, our team held a booth to present our project while also exploring and learning about other teams' ideas. During the exhibition, there was a rather amusing feature that caught my attention - a table tennis table, which was available for participants to play on. I decided to join a game and had good fun playing with other students from all over the world.

Finally, all of our efforts were worth it - we got a gold medal and were named top 5 in high school teams for "Best Education" and "Best Sustainable Development". We were all in a state of shock when the results were announced.



Apart from attending our competition, we also visited several museums, including the Palace of Versailles and the Louvre, which we had seen before only in our textbooks, and which definitely left a great impression. Of course, when you mention Paris, you must think about those famous landmarks such as the Eiffel Tower and the Arc de Triomphe. We were fortunate to visit these two magnificent landmarks as well. Indeed, my only disappointment on the trip was at one restaurant. The reason is that I ordered a steak cooked medium, but when the steak was served, it was well-done, which made the steak almost impossible to eat.



Finally, our whole team would like to express our gratitude to all the teachers who supported us and gave us the opportunity to participate in this competition. During the trip, we faced various problems like the language barrier, jet lag, bad weather conditions and different eating habits, so we were lucky to have such a group of kind teachers and fellows to help us. Personally, this experience opened my eyes and inspired me in many ways. I learnt how to collaborate with different people and acquired new skills such as website programming. Although it was challenging, I still enjoyed the process and will treasure my memories of this competition.



# A Visit to SPCA JCCC(TY)

-- a new hub for the fluffies



Knowing that the Pet Pet Club and the English Club were organizing a tour to the SPCA Jockey Club Centennial Centre in February, Glitter members decided to follow them to visit this newly constructed center in Tsing Yi. We would take you all on a fascinating journey inside.

Located near Cheung Ching Estate, Tsing Yi, the SPCA Jockey Club Centennial Centre could be easily identified by its unique exterior designs from the rest of the industrial buildings. Spanning over 93,000 square feet, the five-storey centre now serves as the hub for all SPCA's animal welfare programmes and education outreach. The centre is also equipped with state-of-the-art technology, which includes an immersive classroom on animal welfare. Murals and paintings relating to puppies are hung within the whole complex. Featuring upgraded adoption facilities, an expansive community space,



fully-fitted conference and seminar rooms, a modern grooming area, and lifestyle retail areas, the center has made itself an ideal place to spend your weekend with your fluffy friends and their cubs.

#### Current figures of unlucky pets



We were welcomed and let in by one of the promoters of the programme, who gave us a lesson and tour of the facility. On average, the Agriculture, Fisheries and Conservation Department handles between 5000 - 7000 stray dogs annually. As for the SPCA, they rescue around 3800 animals, with almost 600 surrendered by pet owners, and 700 strays from the public every year. Among them, around 2600 can be re-homed, while around 1400 are humanely destroyed. Just imagine how disheartening it is to find countless

animals which should have been living a peaceful life were abandoned, strayed, or even killed. There are also illegal breeders raising many pets in horrifying mills, and hardly show respect for their value of life.



## Interested in offering pets a home sweet home?

Considering adopting a pet from the SPCA can definitely save more lives than buying one! This way, the adopted animals will get a new home, and hopefully, shrink the market of inhumane illegal breeding.

Here is a checklist to assess how ready you are for pet adoption. First, can you afford a basic cost for feeding and maintaining hygiene care for the animal? Second, is there a time slot to set aside in your daily schedule for accompanying your fluffy friends? Dogs, in particular, need to be walked outdoors every day. What's more, the flat size of a potential pet owner is also a critical point to look at since adoption is a life-long commitment until death do you part!

Don't forget that parents or guardians should get consulted too. One good way is to invite them to an SPCA adoption center to meet the real 'candidates' and the SPCA staff, who will be most happy to answer queries while conducting background checks to assess your suitability. Do note that adoption isn't totally free-of-charge as the center still needs to pay for its daily operation. A cat, for example, usually costs around HKD\$3500 (excluding SPCA membership fee). That may sound as expensive as buying one, but it is more morally correct to adopt one from the SPCA.

## The key to Victory


